



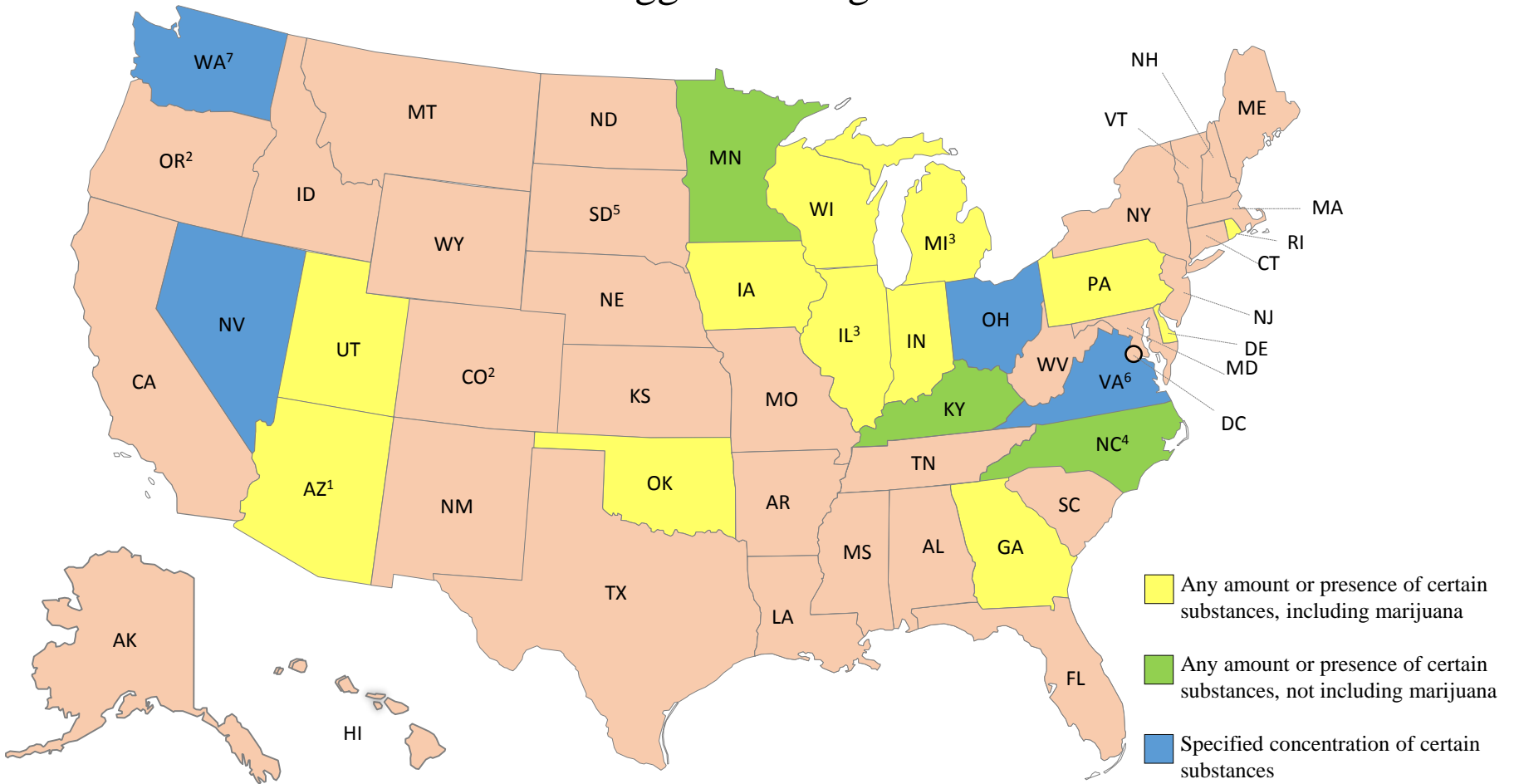

# State Drugged Driving Standards



<sup>1</sup> Arizona – it is illegal to drive with certain defined drugs “or its metabolite in the person’s body.” The Arizona Supreme Court has held that this standard applies only to metabolites “capable of causing impairment.” *State ex rel. Montgomery v. Harris*, 237 Ariz. 98, 346 P.3d 984 (2014).

<sup>2</sup> Colorado and Oregon – it is illegal to use or consume marijuana while driving. <sup>3</sup> Illinois and Michigan – with respect to marijuana, the standard applies only to unlawful use and not the lawful use for medicinal purposes. <sup>4</sup> North Carolina – the standard applies to more substances (including marijuana) for drivers under age 21. <sup>5</sup> South Dakota – for drivers under age 21, the standard is “as long as physical evidence of consumption” of marijuana or a controlled substance remains present in the body. <sup>6</sup> Virginia – marijuana is not one of the specified substances. <sup>7</sup> Washington – THC is the only substance subject to a specified concentration limit.
