Hawaii's program began in the 1940s with data collection on schedule II controlled substances. Today, the program has expanded to collect prescribing data on schedule II through IV controlled substances. Currently, expenses are funded through grants.

With recent enacted legislation, Hawaii's Electronic Prescription Accountability System can now allow sharing of prescription data with other states with government-authorized prescription monitoring programs.
